Faith in Politics or Not?

The Biblical command to obey governing authorities carries the warning that governors do not bear the sword for nothing (Romans 13:1-7; 1 Peter 2:13-17). This may well be the hardest commandment for many of us who live in, what we call, a democratic society today. We need to remember that, historically, the basic duty of government is to maintain law and order, and hence they "bear the sword". In Paul's day people did not expect their government to provide health care, child care, college tuition relief, reproductive rights or sex-change therapy. Our present day U.S. political system is much more complex and takes responsibility for almost every aspect of our lives. This causes moral dilemmas for many of us. How should we act? Jesus was put to death on the authority of the Roman governor, but the reason He died was because He had run afoul of a political system within the Roman Empire. That system was a corrupted form of Judaism. Jesus did not conform to the standards of correctness that Jewish leaders taught. Pilate could not have cared less about their grievances, but they used political coercion to convince him to crucify Jesus. Jesus was no politician; He always told people the truth. He was up front with His followers when He told them that they should expect the world to hate them as it had hated Him. And so, when they began campaigning for Jesus, the same political system that hated Jesus decided to crush them too.

In one of the early confrontations Peter established the platform for those who sincerely follow Christ, and it is far from being a political platform. Two main points surface from Peter's words in Acts 4:5-20:

- 1. Jesus is the only name that provides salvation. (Acts 4:12)
- 2. If you do not like the message, the question is should we obey you or God? Do not expect us to change the message. (Acts 4:19,20)

Peter did not endorse any earthly leader, nor did he unveil any health care plan.

Now look at 2 Peter 2:10 where Peter gives us a description of those whom God considers unrighteous.

...and especially those who indulge in the lust of defiling passion and despise authority. Bold and willful, they do not tremble as they blaspheme the glorious ones,

Obviously, the Apostles are not included among those who despise authority, even though they rebelled against their own rulers. True faith recognizes true authority that glorifies God. True faith also recognizes the powers that set themselves up against God. True faith accepts that sin is the besetting, annihilating curse that must be dealt with, and that it can only be dealt with by God's authority-- not by men's politics. Righteousness is about doing what is right in God's sight, not what is politically expedient.
