Should We Follow the Old Testament Today?

There are 39 books in the Old Testament. As we read these books we encounter history, poetry and prophecy. These writings cover human history from the time when God created all things until the time when God dissolved His covenant with the Hebrew people. That covenant was a means to the fulfillment of God's promise that the seed of Abraham would bring an end to the curse of sin (Genesis 22:18). Jesus is that seed (Galatians 3:16) and now He is our king and mediator of the new covenant in His blood (Hebrews 9:15). There is much to be gained from reading and understanding the writings of the Old Testament, but it is important that, as we read them, we hear God's words in Matthew 17:5:

This is my beloved So, with whom I am well pleased; listen to Him.


When Jesus was transfigured and the Old Testament saints, Moses and Elijah, appeared to talk with Him, we see the connection between Jesus and the Old Testament. God's words, however, make it clear that a new arrangement was being made; a new day was dawning.

There would be no New Testament if there had been no Old Testament. Paul tells us that we should learn from the historical writings (1 Corinthians 10:11). These writings are *instruction* for us, but they are not *commandments*. Our obedience is to Jesus, and his commandments have been brought into the world through His apostles. Jesus made it very clear that if we receive the apostles' teaching we receive Jesus, and if we receive Jesus we receive God (Matthew 10:40).

In the Old Testament we see God's plan to redeem mankind from sin. In the New Testament we see Jesus, the fulfillment of that plan.

In the Old Testament we see how God relates to the world through His holy people, the Jews, and what He expects of His holy people. In the New Testament we see that God's holy people are Christians and we see what He expects of them.

Jews claimed to be related by blood to Abraham.
