Two Greatest Commandments

We can try as hard as we like to make it more complicated, but Jesus boiled it down to these two simple truths. It was very normal, when a rabbi was around, to hear lengthy, involved discussion on all sorts of religious issues. You remember how they loved to posit questions to Jesus about such things as divorce (Mark 10:2) and paying taxes (Mark 12:14) and even about resurrection (Mark 12:18-27). He must have felt that this question was a breath of fresh air:

Which is the greatest commandment? (Mark 12:28). Jesus answers with two:

- And Jesus answered him, the first of all the commandments is, Hear, O Israel; The Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment. (Mark 12:29,30)
- 2. The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." (Mark 12:31)

The questioner is not disappointed with this answer at all, and he joins Jesus in expounding on why these two commandments are so vital.

"Well said, teacher," the man replied. "You are right in saying that God is one and there is no other but him. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself is more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." (Mark 12:32, 33)

There is a positive and a negative expression of both commandments. The first commandment states that there is one God, and we are to love Him (positive). It also states that there is no other god, so by implication we should not love any other god (negative). The second commandment says we are to love our neighbor as ourselves (positive) and the negative expression is "all burnt offerings and sacrifices." These were not forbidden, but they were not to be given as much weight as loving one's neighbor. Offerings could be made to the wrong god(s) or to the one Lord. In either case the offering could be no more than a gesture. In the case of false gods, that is absolutely all a worshiper had to do. But with the one Lord, they were merely signs, or evidence, that there was a relationship between this worshiper and this God. This covenant relationship with the one Eternal Lord promises much more than any of the gods of our day, but He also asks more of us than just a token. Going to church, contributing, even singing and praying can be valid tokens to just about any god. The one Lord asks us to love one another. Check your relationship with God and make sure that it is not consisting mainly of mere tokens.
